Hello

I'm really happy to share with you some of the exciting developments that have happened at Rainbows, which means we are now able to reach more babies, children and young people who benefit from our support.

The first step of that has been putting Rainbows Nurses into hospitals. We've had Nurses in both University Hospitals of Leicester and Nottingham for two years now. They have transformed the support that we're able to offer to babies, children, young people and their families.

In the last 12 months our Nurses in hospitals have been in contact with over 2,400 families, often seeing families many times during their hospital admissions to give expert palliative care and advice, which is double what we had in the preceding year. We've also had 50 referrals to Rainbows; mainly for palliative care and advanced care planning support. Importantly, we're reaching far more babies than we used to, which is what we expected we would do. We're able to offer support to people when they really need it the most.

This is only the beginning of what we're trying to do.

Alongside our Nurses in hospitals, we have an exciting phase of work starting, which is our outreach project, and we're looking forward to sharing more information about this work in the near future.

None of this would be possible without the support of many people across the region, who are very generous with their time and money. On behalf of Rainbows, I would like to say a massive thank you for the part you're playing in enabling us to do all of this; it will make such a difference to babies, children and young people across the region.

Lucas' Story

Lucas was like any other nine-year-old boy. He was happy, active, noisy and loving. His family were looking forward to his imminent birthday but two weeks before the celebrations, mum, Kim, was given the devastating news that Lucas had a brain tumour.

She was told he had two years to live and there was nothing that could be done. The cancer was a very rare form with no cure. Surgery was never an option.

Sadly, Lucas died on December 11 2022, seven months after his diagnosis. "I felt like we had been robbed," said Kim. "He never got to do a bucket list, we didn't have time to do anything with him. It was all so very cruel.

"Lucas was very chatty, he never shut up. He was a cheeky normal 10-year-old boy. He was hyper, very loving and an absolute pleasure to have around. There is definitely a big hole in the house.

"Lucas was never an ill child, I knew when he was ill because he wanted Mummy cuddles. When he began tilting his head to one side and being sick everyone thought he had an ear infection. But his symptoms persisted and worsened.


"Hearing the diagnosis was like they had pulled the rug from under our feet. He went downhill so quickly and by his birthday he was in a wheelchair. It was a very rapid tumour. He lost his mobility very quickly on one side and he was getting very painful headaches."

One day, Lucas caught a cold that affected him very badly, after that, he was unable to speak. He had lost his mobility and he communicated with his eyes. "The kid never shut up and then he couldn't talk, it was so hard," said Kim. "We knew the differences in him every single day. We knew when we woke up that he would have declined more."

Kim and Lucas came to our hospice in October 2022 and never left. For an exhausted Kim, she was able to recharge her batteries and be mum rather than a constant carer as she leaned on our team.

"We came to Rainbows and we went swimming and he enjoyed a massage. Lucas loved coming to Rainbows. His older brother, Tyler, came to see him and they played in the pool together and I could hear the giggles. I hadn't heard giggles for a long time. A real belly giggle. I don't think he ever giggled again after that.

"At Rainbows I knew he was looked after. The support for Lucas and myself was amazing. And Lucas' other brother, Rian, was also able to visit. Jamie was also able to come at weekends.





"One night, Lucas became unwell, I had been at home as I had a cold and didn't want to pass it on to him. The Rainbows Nurses called me to come in. I got there and climbed into bed with him and held him. Both Jamie and I were with him. When Lucas went to sleep I told him that I loved him so much and we will be ok if you have to go. Then I kissed him good night on the forehead then he went to sleep.

"The team at Rainbows are all amazing and they helped so much. It is like one big family."

It made us determined to do more. Without hesitation, we have committed to raising more funds and more awareness, increasing our Rainbows fundraising target for the year ahead."

Day in the Life of...

Katie Brant Clinical Nurse Specialist in Paediatric Palliative Care

8:00 am - I arrive at the hospital and log on to see which babies, children and young people are inpatients, who has been discharged and any significant events that have occurred over the weekend. This helps me plan my day and prioritise who needs to be seen.

8:15 am - I update the Rainbows Family Support Team regarding who is in hospital and therefore, may require some additional support.

8:30 am - Time to catch up on a few emails whilst patients are still asleep, liaising on their care and management with a wide range of professionals.

9:00 am - I meet with my colleague Gemma (Rainbows Clinical Nurse Specialist in Neonatal Palliative Care) for a team meeting and to discuss any babies transitioning from neonates to paediatrics that may require input.

9:30 am - I meet with one of the Hospital Doctors to review a child on the ward and discuss their current management and ongoing care plans. I then liaise with the hospital staff involved in their care and ring their Rainbows allocated Family Support Worker to update them and discuss additional support for the family.

10:00 am - Next I have a virtual Microsoft Teams meeting with the Community Nursing Team and the Continuing Care Team to discuss shared patients and highlight any who are deteriorating, those that have additional health needs following admission or any changes in management. It is important to ensure all professionals continue to communicate, ensuring care is coordinated and support is optimised from all services.

10:20 am - I get a call to see a child on the Intensive Care Unit, who is sadly approaching the end of their life, as their parents would like to explore the transfer of care to Rainbows. We spend time discussing their wishes, what matters to them most and what support and opportunities are available to them as a family to make memories together. There is a lot of coordination required to transfer a child to Rainbows in order to ensure it is a smooth transition for the family. This means lots of calls and discussions to ensure it is safe and in line with families wishes and I put the appropriate plans in place to support the transfer.

11:10 am – I send a quick email to Rosie (Rainbows Music Therapist) with a list of patients who I think would benefit from a session during her monthly ward round at the hospital.

11:15 am - Next I head to the wards to see a few babies, children and young people across the hospital - check in on how they are doing, review their symptom management, offer support and advice to the Nursing Team and assess if any additional support from Rainbows Outreach Team is required.

In my role, every day is different, whilst I have some scheduled meetings, due to the nature of the childrens' conditions, things can change very quickly. I am adaptive and responsive to their needs and those of the teams caring for them. Most days I spend a lot of time pinballing between wards and liaising with the wide range of professionals, to ensure care is coordinated.



12:15 pm - I get a call from a family in the community whose child's condition is causing concern. We discuss what is going on for the child and decide it is best that they attend A & E to be assessed. I then call A & E to let them know the child is coming in and I share their medical history.

12:30 pm - I log on and attend the Rainbows MDT (Multi Disciplinary Team) meeting. This enables me to talk about my caseload and get input from the wider Rainbows Team, to ensure we are meeting each family's needs.

1:30 pm - I have been asked to attend an outpatient appointment for a family and assess their holistic needs to see what additional support can be implemented. I introduce myself and discuss support, they consent to a Rainbows referral.

2:00 pm - A call comes from A & E to review a baby who has been brought in via ambulance. I assess their needs and discuss next steps with their team, providing some emotional support to the parents at this challenging time.

3:00 pm - I spend some time away from the wards with a child's parents to revise their daughter's Advance Care Plan - exploring their wishes for their child and her end-of-life care, putting in place appropriate plans to support this. It is a really important part of my role to discuss families wishes, ensuring care is provided in a location of their choice.

4:00 pm - I take a last look at emails and get ready to head home. Tomorrow will be a different needs day, supporting children and their families facing new challenges and uncertainties.

Meet our Band 5 Nurse Adele Carroll who is now funded by our Business Club members



Tell us about your role?

As a Band 5 Nurse within the Hospice, I get to support and encourage the independence of babies, children, young people (BCYP) and their families through therapeutic relationships.

Why did you apply for this role?

Growing up I spent a lot of time at Rainbows as a sibling for respite visits and at sibling events. It was my favourite place to visit as a family and also be around other siblings to whom I could relate. I always knew growing up that I wanted to work here and therefore did my nurse training to be here in this role today. I often get nostalgic driving into the hospice of myself as an eight/nine-year-old girl, very excited for what was in store for me. I now work with some of those same nurses and Hospice Care Assistants (HCAs) that remember me from then.

What difference do you hope to make to our families?

I hope to be the support and reassurance that families are looking for both short-term and long-term. I love being able to manage the complex care regime of the BCYP and allowing parents or carers to be just that and have the chance to focus on themselves as a family. If I can make one small difference, whether that be a smile, keeping the BCYP comfortable, or relieving any worries for a family, then I have achieved my goals as a nurse.

You spend all day helping others, how do you relax?

I love spending time with family and friends, reading, and going for walks. I also crochet and have an embarrassingly large stash of wool and yarn.

Do you have a message for our supporters?

Thank you. Rainbows would not be what it is without you. Your contributions mean that we can continue to support families and BCYP with complex needs to provide them with a place of relaxation, freedom, and laughter. Thank you to all the amazing volunteers who dedicate their time to keep the gardens beautiful, keeping the shops running, and making such a huge difference to the whole charity.



Abigail watched her unborn baby's heart take its final beat during a scan and thought she would never again feel such an unbearable pain.

But she had to keep strong as her baby, Zion, was a twin. Zoe was born a few days later at 26-weeks-old. For Abigail, her husband Jeremiah, and their young daughters, Samantha and Joan, their world continued to be thrown into turmoil as Zoe's health continued to deteriorate. But tiny Zoe was a fighter.

"We were told so many times that she wouldn't make it, but we kept going and refused to give up." said Abigail. "We were with her every day. I knew that she was always happy when we were around, even though she was in so much pain.

"We came home from hospital just before her first birthday and was referred to Rainbows. I was ready to accept any kind of help. I was put in touch with a Family Support Nurse who was so nice and helpful."

During her year in hospital, Zoe had a Tracheostomy and Gastrostomy and she is fed through a tube. She also has very weak muscles and endures a lot of physiotherapy.

"During my pregnancy with the twins, I felt completely exhausted and had high blood pressure," said Abigail. "At 23-weeks pregnant, doctors realised Zion was very sick. One night, I was struggling so much. I woke and could feel one twin wasn't moving. A few hours later, while having a scan, I watched my baby's heart take its final beat. I just didn't know what to do or how to react. I felt like I was in space unable to respond.

I literally saw her heart stop beating."

Then Abigail became very ill and was advised to give birth to Zoe in order to save her own life. "Two weeks after her sister had given up and I was emotionally drained, I gave birth to Zoe via a C-section," she said. "It was a very strange time. I was scared and sad. I didn't know whether to cry or scream. I was just there."

For the family, life has been a struggle and they have all benefitted from the support of Rainbows. Zoe, who is now two-and-a-half, simply loves our hospice and its staff.

"Rainbows has taken care of us so well," said Abigail. "When you see people who are so nice, you know they will look after your child with kindness and sincerity. I knew that I could relax and the first night we stayed at Rainbows, I couldn't wait to get to bed so I could actually sleep. That was the first time I had been away from Zoe but I had confidence that they would look after her. There was always someone there by her side making sure Zoe was okay.

"Rainbows has also been really beneficial for my other daughters as they take part in activities at the Hospice and they know there are people around them who care and understand.

"Sometimes this life is so unpredictable, I learned to try my best, even if you don't know the end result. Zoe makes me so happy, she is so resilient and always smiling."

Meet Karen, our new Clinical Nurse Specialist in Paediatric Palliative Care.

Karen is employed by Rainbows but works for the University Hospitals of Northamptonshire NHS group and Northamptonshire Healthcare Foundation Trust. She is part of our Nurses in Hospitals team as well as the larger Palliative Care Team at our hospice.

Working across Northampton General Hospital, Kettering General Hospital and Northamptonshire Healthcare Foundation Trust, Karen works with babies, children and young people with serious and terminal illnesses, who need the support of our expert team as well as supporting referrals to our Hospice.

With 26 years of experience in her field, Karen provides a different approach to care, a holistic one, which takes into account the child's family and offers support to them too. Karen is part of the 'face of Rainbows' in the hospitals but has a large expert multi-disciplinary team behind her at the Hospice and across the NHS Trust.

From diagnosis to end of life, Karen is alongside the family on their journey, parallel planning, liaising with other teams and ensuring Rainbows' services and therapies are offered not only at the Hospice, but also in hospital and at home.

Another aspect of her role is identifying new families, reaching out to those who may not know about our charity, and making sure they are referred to us to access the support they need. She can explain the wide range of services available from us and what can be offered at home or in hospital. She is also an advocate for families and bridges the gap between services to ensure they are being cared for in their preferred place.

Karen said: "It is about helping the families to find a way through the stress and emotions of caring for their child. I value the ethos of Rainbows and this role is all about very important choices for the families, ones they may not have known existed - whether that is at Hospice, hospital or home.

"I love the uniqueness of this role and recognise the gap for Northamptonshire in ensuring families know about Rainbows. I will provide holistic support for emotional, physical and spiritual needs of the whole family and I look forward to working within the community."
